FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is University of Scouting? Supplemental training offered through a BSA council. There are classes of interest for each of the program areas: Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing, Youth Education, and Sea Scouts. Plus, the Continuing Education area offers a wide range of classes on a variety of potential interests for anyone in Scouting.

Who should consider attending University of Scouting? Adults (including parents) and youth currently registered in Scouting.

I am new to Scouting – will University of Scouting be too overwhelming for me? No, there are classes designed in each program area for a beginning Scouter.

I am a long-time Scouter – what does University of Scouting have to offer me? There are classes offered in each program area for someone in Scouting wanting additional knowledge in their program area, plus numerous classes offered in the Continuing Education area. This area contains classes that could be of a specific interest to someone in any program area.

May I take courses in any area that interests me? Yes, you can pick and choose classes of interest to you and apply those credits toward a degree.

How do I get a degree? Obtaining a degree is as simple as attending all seven classes at one University of Scouting, and Tidewater Council holds a University of Scouting once every year. Degrees progress in order of Associate's, Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctorate. Attendees not pursuing a degree will earn a Certificate in Advanced Studies.

Can youth participants earn a degree? No. While University of Scouting is an excellent opportunity for youth to learn Scouting and leadership skills, they will not earn a degree.

Why should I consider earning a University of Scouting degree? It's an incentive to attend the University of Scouting and learn more about the Scouting program, and it recognizes your time spent in the process. The youth we serve like to see their leaders earn recognition for training efforts. Plus, you can earn a cool patch, with rockers.

Must I complete the degrees in order?? Yes, but you don't have to take any specific classes for Associate's, Bachelor's, or Master's degrees. Any seven (7) credits will qualify (one 50-min session = 1 credit). You should take the classes best suited for your own needs or in areas you want to learn more about.

How does the Tidewater Council's University of Scouting compare to programs in other Councils? Most of the Universities of Scouting across the nation are very similar in design and structure and have all the different program areas covered in our council's University of Scouting.

Who should consider the Doctoral program? Any active Scouter who currently holds a Master's degree and wants to learn more. It's the next step in the University of Scouting degree progression. We need your expertise and experience in the program!

GENERAL INFORMATION

PURPOSE

The purpose of the University of Scouting is to promote fellowship and provide training for adult volunteers involved in the Scouting program. The University of Scouting is a FUN-filled training program to help develop Scouter excellence in Tidewater Council. All BSA-registered adults and youth are encouraged to attend so that they may better understand the critical role and function of their position in the Scouting program. This training experience is planned to:

- **PROVIDE** Scouters with a fuller understanding of their role in Scouting,
- **BOLSTER** commitment to the success of Scouting's mission,
- SUPPORT a training continuum to carry out individual unit assignments,
- **BUILD** fellowship in the Scouting community.

These results are achieved through a broad curriculum of instruction and recognition of achievement by a series of awards. Each new participant will receive a University of Scouting patch. Participants who complete degree requirements will be recognized with an appropriate patch segment for that degree and a certificate/diploma.

POLICY STATEMENT

To maintain the stature of the training program of the University and to give a sense of accomplishment to the recipients, the following policies will govern the event:

- 1. To receive credit for a course, a Scouter must attend the course and sign the class roster.
- 2. Degrees will be acknowledged by appropriate patches and certificates. Such awards will be made upon completion of the program requirements.
- Credit for courses completed in other councils or at national training centers will be given upon presentation of evidence that you satisfactorily completed the course. Your District Commissioner or District Chairman must approve the credits.
- The extent to which the Tidewater Council University of Scouting may substitute courses for courses offered will be at the sole discretion of the appropriate Program Dean and the University President.

REGISTRATION AND FEES

To minimize congestion at check-in and to expedite the check-in process, participant and instructor registration will be done in-advance online. The registration fee covers the cost of materials, food, and facility use. Please review all information in this catalog before completing the online registration process.

PROGRAM DEPARTMENTS

Our University of Scouting curriculum is divided into seven program departments:

- 1. Cub Scouting
- 2. Scouts BSA
- 3. Venturing
- 4. Sea Scouting
- 5. Continuing Education
- 6. **Doctoral**
- 7. Youth Education

A Scouter who completes seven (7) credits (one 50-min session = 1 credit) from any combination of classes qualifies for a program degree starting with Associate's. Scouters become eligible to earn the Bachelor's and Master's degrees, by completing additional blocks of seven credit hours for each degree. All programs feed into one Doctoral degree. Individual degree requirements are described in this catalog for each level. The University of Scouting Doctoral Program has distinct requirements based upon program concentrations.

UoS instructors can earn one credit for each 50-min session they teach, up to three credits per year. To earn the credits, instructors must submit a set of PowerPoint slides, and a single-page lesson plan, for each class they are teaching, to the UoS President via the appropriate Program Dean two weeks prior to conducting their sessions.


UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT

Midway - Sign up for the Class!

A Midway area will be available throughout the event. The University of Scouting is not an accredited university; therefore, all degrees conferred are not awarded from an accredited university.

YOUTH PROGRAM

The Tidewater Council University of Scouting is pleased to offer a dedicated program just for youth. Youth courses are provided to increase a Scout's knowledge and their ability to lead their unit. Some of the leadership courses can also apply towards specific Venturing Awards. Classes in the youth program are designated by the prefix YTH.

REMINDERS

All adults must complete online Youth Protection Training (YPT) prior to attending the UoS. Since the University of Scouting is considered supplemental training, position-specific BSA training and/or BSA basic training certificates will not be issued.

The Red Cross CPR training is a blended-learning course that includes an online portion and an instructor-led classroom skills session. The online portion **must** be completed in order to attend the in-class portion. **This requirement cannot be waived.** Please be prepared to provide your instructor with proof that you completed the online portion. There is an additional \$20.00 cost for the CPR course.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

ASSOCIATE'S DEGREE (University patch and Associate's Tab)

- Must be a registered Scouter
- Register online for the University of Scouting
- Attend the University for the first time and seven (7) classes on this track and sign the course roster sheet in each class at the end of each session

BACHELOR'S DEGREE (Bachelor's Tab)

- Must be a registered Scouter
- Register online for the University of Scouting
- Attend the University a second year having earned an Associate's degree and attend seven (7)
 classes on this track and sign the course roster sheet in each class at the end of each session

MASTER'S DEGREE (Master's Tab)

- Must be a registered Scouter
- Register online for the University of Scouting
- Attend the University a third year having previously earned Associate's and Bachelor's degrees and attend seven (7) classes for this track and sign the course roster sheet in each class at the end of each session
- Volunteer to teach at least one course at the University (optional)

DOCTORATE DEGREE (Doctorate Tab)

- Must be a registered Scouter
- Register online for the University of Scouting
- Attend the University previously (provide verification to Program Dean) having previously earned Associate's, Bachelor's and Master's degrees
- Completion of the non-credit class DOC 614 for the approval of your Doctoral Project, Thesis or Research Paper and two (2) of the DOC 600-level courses
- Volunteer to teach at least two lower-level track courses at the University (optional)
- Procure all appropriate signatures on the Doctoral application
- Complete your approved Doctoral Project, Thesis or Research Paper and submit it to the Dean of the Doctoral Program.

Reminder: Scouts participating in the Youth Program do not earn degrees.

SBSA 101

I Took my Scout Leader Training Online. Now What.....?

Online courses are a great way to get position trained, but they don't offer opportunities to ask questions or meet other leaders. This course offers supplemental information and the chance to get to know other troop leaders just like you.

SBSA 104

Fundraising for Your Unit

Offering different fundraising opportunities and how to carry out a fundraising program.

SBSA 108

The Scoutmaster, Troop Organization and Membership

Learn about the qualities that should be expected of a Scoutmaster. Explore what the Scoutmaster should be, know and do. Learn the structure of the troop, including key youth leadership positions. Find out about a troop's support functions and the responsibilities of adult leadership positions. Discuss the ways that creating new members is good for youth and Scout troops.

SBSA 109

Troop Meetings and Uniforms

Explore the real purpose of a troop meeting. Learn the value of using the troop meeting plan. Find out about the importance of having the boys plan, conduct and review the troop meeting. Find out about the vital role the Scoutmaster plays by providing coaching, support and leaderships to the Scouts. Learn about the importance of the uniform as one of the Eight Methods of Scouting.

SBSA 110

Working with Youth Leaders and the Patrol Leaders Council

Learn practical approaches to achieving the aims of Scouting by building a fully functional, self-sustaining youth leadership team. This course discusses the adult role in working with the PLC and provides concrete actions to develop a Troop's youth leadership team.

SBSA 111

The Scouts BSA Outdoor Program

Learn the importance of the outdoor program -specifically that the outdoors is the arena in which a lot
of Scouting unfolds. The outdoor program is the reason
that many youth and adults join the program. Skills and
safety are the two main elements that the adult leaders
of a troop are tasked with providing. Learn how this can
be accomplished while still having a Scout-led troop.

SBSA 114

Recruiting and Retaining Youth in Scouts BSA

Learn the keys to successfully reaching out and attracting Webelos dens to your troop. In addition, learn about recruiting 5th and 6th graders using an open house and peer-to-peer recruiting.

SBSA 115

How to Run a Troop Meeting

An experienced Senior Patrol Leader and Scoutmaster will discuss how to effectively run a troop meeting. This session is valuable for adult leaders to take back and share with/instruct members of their troop.

SBSA 169

Scouts BSA STEM (not STEM certification)

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) is one of the hottest new focuses in Scouting. This course will feature some practical ways to introduce STEM into your troop's year around program.

200 Level Courses

SBSA 201

Basic Knots (Two Sessions Offered)

Knot tying has always been a key part of the Scouting program — for good reasons. It teaches useful skills that can be used immediately. This session teaches the basic knots that every Scout should know: Bowline, Square Knot, Sheet Bend, Sheepshank, Two Half Hitches, Clove Hitch, Taut-line Hitch, and Timber Hitch. This course will be taught outdoors. Dress accordingly and bring a camp chair.

SBSA 202

Lashings (Two Sessions Offered)

Lashings are used to join poles or spars to enable the construction of objects and structures. Learn the Basic Strop, Simple & West Country Round, Simple & Racking Turn Shear, Simple & Racking Turn Tripod, Basic Square, Mark 2 Square & Japanese Square, Basic Diagonal & Mark 2 Diagonal. This course will be taught outdoors. Dress accordingly and bring a camp chair.

SBSA 203

Advanced Knots (Two Sessions Offered)

Expand Your "Knot-ledge" – With the family of 8's: Alpine Butterfly, Farmers Loop, Zeppelin Bend, Double Fisherman, Water Knot, Constrictor Knot, Mooring Hitch, Highway Man's Hitch, Rolling Hitch, Trucker's Hitch, Monkeys Fist and the legendary Dragon Bowline (it's real). This course will be taught outdoors. Dress accordingly and bring a camp chair.

SBSA 205

High Adventure

High Adventure is the chance for Scouts to experience something they may never experience again. Learn about the various high adventure opportunities that Scouts BSA provide, such as Philmont, Sea Base, Northern Tier, Swamp Base, The Bechtel Summit, Lenhok'sin High Adventure, High Knoll, and the Appalachian Trail.

SBSA 208

All About Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST)

Troop Leaders who use Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST) as part of their youth leadership development will present and discuss how they incorporate the program into their unit's annual program. ILST helps the youth leadership to develop their leadership skills.

SBSA 214

The Troop Committee

Discusses the roles and responsibilities of the troop committee. Provides guidance and suggestions on how the troop committee can help the Scouts and Scouters deliver a guality Scouting program.

Venturing Program

(Please note: Although completion of the Bachelor's degree for Venturing and Sea Scouting is recommended before taking Venturing Master's level courses, course participants will need at least a "Fast Start" level of understanding of the Venturing and Sea Scouting program to achieve the benefits of taking these courses.

100 Level Courses

VEN 101

Here's Venturing

Introduces Venturing's mission, methods, and unique place in the BSA's program. Explains and discusses Venturing organizational structure and adult and youth leadership positions.

VEN 102

Venturing Awards and Recognition

Describes Venturing awards and recognitions and their unique features. Covers both youth and adult Venturing awards and recognitions. Provides a basic understanding of how an effective awards and recognition program contributes to the healthy progression of youth Venturing.

VEN 103

Venturing Resources and Program Planning

Describes how to use Venturing literature and resources to plan an exciting crew program. Covers how to use the Program Capability Inventory, Venturing Activity Interest Survey, and good ol' brainstorming to develop an Annual Program Plan. Explains the importance of an effective youth-adult leadership team in having successful crew activities.

VEN 104

Understanding and Protecting Venturing Youth

Provides a basic understanding of the characteristics of Venturing youth. Explains the safety and youth protection policies applicable to Venturing.

VEN 105

Venturing Youth Leadership Development

Explains the components of an effective Youth Leadership Development Program and the critical role of the Crew Advisor in youth leadership development. Describes Venturing youth leadership training programs and opportunities at the unit, council, regional, and national levels.

VFN 106

How to Run a Crew Meeting

An experienced Crew President and Crew Advisor and crew members will teach how to effectively run a crew meeting. Although aimed at youth, this session is still valuable for adult leaders to take back and share with/instruct members of their crew.

300 Level Courses

VEN 314

High Adventure Programs: Beyond the National Bases

Learn about high adventure programs available locally and nationally. Emphasis is on hidden gems—programs that may not be well known but are exciting and cost-efficient. High adventure programs at Broad Creek, including the latest V-Week programming, will be highlighted.

Sea Scout Program

100 Level Courses

SSC 101

Introduction to Sea Scouts in the Hampton Roads Area

This course provides an overview of the Sea Scouting program and the opportunities for Sea Scouting in the Hampton Roads area. This course is designed for those who are not currently involved in the Sea Scout program. No sailing or prior boating experience is required.

200 Level Courses

SSC 201

How to Start a Sea Scout Ship

This course will review the steps to organize a Sea Scout ship and will provide information on suggested programs and activities for a new Sea Scout unit. Scouters from any Scouting program may find this material useful.

300 Level Courses

SSC 301

Finding the Right Vessel for Your Unit

Should we get a 55-foot sailing ketch or a few canoes? Deciding what vessels to acquire can be a hard decision for any unit whether a troop, crew, or ship. This lesson will provide a basic overview of what to look for and will cover some the BSA requirements for Scouting vessels. Scouters from any Scouting program may find this material useful.

SSC 302

Long Cruise Planning and Execution

Learn how to plan a Sea Scout Long Cruise leaving from right here in Hampton Roads. The Sea Scout program relies on an annual Long Cruise just like Scouting relies on summer camp or Venturing Tier III activities.

SSC 304

Ship Program Planning

Program is what makes Sea Scouting exciting. However, every ship needs a plan to deliver quality program to young men and women. Learn about the exciting program opportunities that exist right here in Hampton Roads.

Doctoral Program

DOC 604

Selecting and Researching the Doctoral Thesis Topic

Selecting the Research topic and defining the issue or problem. Researching the issue and methods of presentations. An explanation of the various methods required to prepare, research, write and present the Doctoral paper.

DOC 605

Developing the Doctoral Outline and Thesis

A workshop on developing an outline of a thesis/project and using it to structure your doctoral paper. Course covers the elements of a useful thesis.

DOC 614

Doctoral Counseling

A counseling session with a faculty member on topic selection, research and thesis preparation, and the application procedure. THIS IS A NON-CREDIT COURSE.

Continuing Education Program

100 Level Courses

CED 101

Functions of the District Committee

This basic course will examine the four functions of the District Committee, the duties of each position, as well as those of the District Key-3.

CED 103

Tentaroo

Tentaroo is our council's online registration program for all activities. Learn how to use it to manage event registrations. This course is for Scouters, parents, and Event Coordinators.

CED 113

Advancement Program and Paperwork

Are you familiar with the Four Steps of Advancement? Did you know that advancement was one of the Eight Methods of Scouting? Learn how advancement ties Scouting's Eight Methods together. Explore what paperwork is necessary to manage a Scout troop well.

CED 114

Recruiting and Retaining Adults in Boys Scouts and Cub Scouts

The course describes what to say to inspire adults to join a troop, pack, ship or crew volunteer team. In addition, learn several approaches for effectively communicating your message and moving adults to volunteer.

CED 115

Working with Scouts that have Autism

How to fully engage and involve autistic individuals in Scouting and working with the challenges.

CED 116

How to Handle Bullying in Scouting

Ways of identifying and handling bullying in your unit.

CED 117

Scouting Religious Emblems and Awards

This course will introduce you to the various programs within BSA and the religious communities that draw Scouts closer to God. Information involving what programs exist, the PRAY program, and how one goes about recruiting, networking, presenting, and continuing such programs within the Scout units and the religious community.

CED 118

Social Challenges Facing Today's Scouting Youth

This class focuses on the social challenges of today's youth. As an adult leader knowing about, recognizing, and knowing where to get help is important for success. The class will focus on bullying, vaping and controlled substances, social media and cell phones, and suicide awareness. We will focus on local laws, BSA rules, and examples of situations, and where to get support and help from National recognized support and prevention programs, government, and the BSA!

CED 122

Geocaching (Two-Hour Class)

Learn how to use this new sport to enhance the Scouting program. Participants will learn about how the sport of geocaching (a high-tech treasure hunt based on GPS technology) works, about ways geocaching can add excitement to unit and district programs while supporting traditional Scouting skills and values, and about resources to support geo-Scouting. Weather permitting the class will participate in a hands-on exercise to find a geocache using GPSs. Dress accordingly.

CED 132

Working with Scouts with Special Needs

"Scouting helps by giving Scouts with disabilities an opportunity to prove to themselves and to others that they can do things- and difficult things too- for themselves." Robert Baden-Powell

This class will discuss how to make Scouting accessible and enjoyable to all youth regardless of their abilities. Scouting is a program for everybody – no matter their ability.

CED 144

Outdoor Ethics (formerly Introduction to Leave No Trace - LNT)

The goal of this BSA Outdoor Ethics Orientation course is to introduce the concept of outdoor ethics to a group with little experience in outdoor ethics in a fun and engaging way. It will help adults at all program levels understand the general principles behind Scouting's outdoor ethics program by reviewing the principles of outdoor ethics and leave no trace.

CED 155

Adult First Aid/CPR/AED (Two Sessions Offered)
Learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) from a
certified Red Cross instructor. (\$20 additional fee)

Important Details. This blended learning Adult CPR/AED/First Aid course includes an online portion and an instructor-led classroom skills session. The online portion must be completed before attending the in-class portion. Most learners complete the online portion in approximately two hours. However, your experience may vary widely based on several factors including your PC, internet speed and previous training. Beginning the online session as soon as possible is recommended to ensure you have completed it prior to the in-person skill session. Please be prepared to provide your instructor with proof that you completed the online portion by printing your online course completion record that is available at the end of the online portion of the course and show it to your instructor - it will read "Proceed to Skill Session".

CED 167 Journey to Excellence

"Scouting's Journey to Excellence" is the BSA's National performance recognition program designed to encourage & reward success, and to measure the performance of our units, districts, and councils. The "Journey to Excellence" is based on what successful units do to continually improve.

CED 177 Great Local Campsites & Virginia High Adventure Opportunities

In the Tidewater area, we have some wonderful camp sites tucked away near the shore and inland. Learn about great local campsites within a two-hour drive, and Virginia high adventure opportunities.

200 Level Courses

CED 209

Trailer Safety

Ever wonder why sometimes your trailer just doesn't tow well? Have you had a trailer breakdown on the road? Join us for a demonstration and discussion of towing a trailer, including: safety, packing, wheel bearings, trailer hitches, loading and unloading, insurance, and lessons learned.

CED 213

Scoutbook Essentials (Two-Hour Class)

A discussion of Scouting's unit management software for unit leader. Learn how to add connections; add and approve awards/advancement work; set up events for dens/patrols; send messages, and a variety of other tasks.

CED 227

UoS Instructors

UoS instructors will earn one credit for each class they teach, up to three credits per year. To earn the credits please submit PowerPoint slides and a single-page lesson plan for each course to the UoS President prior to conducting the sessions.

CED 229

You Have a NYLT-trained Youth. Now What?

Learn about the training involved with NYLT and how to channel the skills and enthusiasm of NYLT-trained Scouts to improve your unit's program.

CED 233

Maps and Compass: Navigation Basics (Three-Hour Class)

Learn to navigate with maps and compass. Coverage of basic geographic terminology, the different types of compasses, maps and charts, and what each is used for, the principles of the Earth's magnetic fields and common symbols and terminology used on maps. How to put those skills into practical use for navigating in all environments. This course is good for either beginner or intermediate skill levels and will help you to bring these critical navigation skills back to your troops, crews and ships. Students are requested to bring a compass, pencil, and straight edge. All other supplies will be provided.

300 Level Courses

CED 305 (Formerly DCS 305) Unit Startup and Growth Planning

This newly-updated DYNAMIC advanced membership course will examine the resources needed to develop a district growth plan. Participants will learn how to recognize under-served areas of their district and identify potential chartered organizations in their communities. This information will form the foundation for developing a plan to see that every youth in a district has the opportunity to join in the adventure of Scouting.

CED 307 (Formerly DCS 307) Planning District and Council Events

An overview of some of the factors to be considered in the planning, staffing, preparation and execution of district and council level events. This course will help the Event Chair organize and prepare for a year's worth of Cub Scout and Scouts BSA events such as Pinewood Derbies, Blue and Gold Banquets, Klondike Derbies, Camporees, Webelosrees, and Merit Badge University. If you're new to this, we will help get you started on the right path. If you're an old hand, perhaps you can share some lessons learned.

CED 313

Scoutbook Administration (Two- Hour Class)

Scoutbook is BSA's official advancement management tool. Learn how to add, remove, and transfer Scouts; add dens and patrols; approve permissions for leaders; add parents and other connections; add pack/troop events to the calendar as well as enable notifications/RSVPs; and more. While anyone is welcome to attend, this class is aimed at unit advancement chairs and Scoutbook administrators.

CED 320

Midway (Two Sessions Offered)

Explore the Midway displays to learn about history, adventure areas for youth, fun opportunities from local clubs/locations, and about gear offered by local FOS supporters. Offered before and after lunch.

YTH 101

The Patrol Method / A Youth Run Troop

Is your troop really youth run? What is the Patrol Method, why is it important, and does it really work? Find out how and why it works and why it is important for the troop and the Scout.

YTH 102

First Class in First Year

Learn how to develop and implement a troop program to help new Scouts achieve the First Class rank by the end of their first year.

YTH 103

So. You Want to Be a Patrol Leader

For those who are, or want to be, Patrol Leaders. You will identify your most important roles and responsibilities. This class will also satisfy the Goal Setting & Time Management course requirement for the Venturing Discovery Award.

YTH 304

Mentoring Training Module

This course will provide you with tools that can help you be a good mentor, not just in your crew but also at school, your place of worship and even with your siblings. This class will also satisfy the mentoring course requirement for the Venturing Summit Award.

YTH 305

Project Management Skills for Life (Two-Hour Class)

This class will help you develop the abilities to plan projects, trips, outings and activities. Those who venture into this class will hone their skills in the areas of leadership, delegation and keeping plans on track for success.
