

## **Tidewater Council's Growth Continues**

In 2016 the Tidewater Council continued our progress toward excellence.

Our camping operations saw the biggest number of summer camp attendees in many years and the year-round program was hugely successful.

Our 100% Youth Protection and 100% trained leaders are the best in the nation. Our units received increased visits from unit commissioners.

We implemented an online registration process for some events this year.

We have strengthened our program and activities committees and membership committees and are building on our many successful fund raising operations.

We continue to engage more people in our volunteer ranks so we can serve more of the youth of the Tidewater area. The more we enlist, the better we will fulfill our promise to give every available youth an opportunity to join Scouting.

I extend my personal thanks to the youth-facing volunteers who bring our program alive, along with the officers and members of the Tidewater Council board.

### Recruitment, Training, and Dedication Keys to Unit Service Success Goals

The Commissioner service showed great improvement from unit positions. This in unit visitation this past year, finishing in second place among the 93 councils in the 13 states comprising BSA's the Council Commissioner. Southern Region.

To further demonstrate the significance of this accomplishment it must be recognized that this was a 100 percent improvement over the previous year and done with approximately half of the previous year's staff.

Likewise, the timeliness and accuracy of charter renewals vastly improved with 165 charters turned in compared to only 53 turned in by the same date last year. This can be attributed to the joint efforts of Commissioners and the professional staff with the kickoff from the Charter Leadership Summit.

Many challenges still must be overcome. To provide the level of Commissioner service each unit is to receive and to ensure all unit charters are renewed in a timely manner. The number of commissioners must increase not just in numbers but in numbers of individuals dedicated to serving the units as Commissioner. Each district must recruit at least five new members to the Commissioner staff to meet our unit service mission.

To achieve this goal, a master prospect list will be drawn up by the existing Commissioner staff using lists of Eagle Scouts and leaders that have recently dropped list will be submitted to

Commissioners should ask at least three people to join the Commissioner staff of each district each month. Names will be recorded of those that were asked, who was recruited, and those that rejected the offer. This information will then be provided to the Council Commissioner

by the end of the first week of each month to be included in the monthly report to the board.

Additional training must be provided new Commissioners to ensure full understanding of the position requirements. Detailed charter renewal procedures must be included in this training and offered at least twice a year, once in the spring and again in late summer or early fall.

The goals of achieving a council-wide unit visitation record of eighty percent and all units submitting charter renewal paperwork on time is doable. Recruitment, training, and dedication are the keys to success.

The **Silver Beaver Award** is the council-level distinguished service to youth award of the Boy Scouts of America. Recipients are registered adult leaders who have made an impact on the lives of youth through service given to the council.

The Silver Beaver is an award given to those who implement the Scouting program and perform community service through hard work, self-sacrifice, dedication, and many years of service. It is given to those who do not actively seek it.

**CHRISTY COOPER** has been a Coast Guard wife for 17 years and lived in Alaska, Washington, Michigan, South Carolina, Georgia, and North Carolina.



She and husband Jon's four boys are Scouts. Nick (16) -Eagle, Jacob and Matthew (14) -Life, and Christian (11) - First Class. She has held a variety of positions including den lead-

er, Cubmaster, and committee member position with Pack 158.

At the Boy Scout level she is a committee member holding the advancement chair position in Troop 182.

Christy also serves on the district level in Albemarle as the membership chair. In 2015 she attended National Camp School and came back to run the Outer Banks and Elizabeth City Day Camps in June 2015. # Redskins QB Great Joe Theismann Headlines 2016 Leadership Breakfast

Tidewater Council welcomed former Washington Redskins quarterback Joe Theismann and NFL "Man of the Year" as the featured speaker for its 16th Annual Leadership Breakfast.

The event was held on Thursday, March 24, 2016 at the Virginia Beach Convention Center, attracting more than 300 guests.

Rick Anoia served as the 2016 vice president for Friends of Scouting with council development director Dr. Susan Miley-Petrehn providing professional support.


Scott Cash emceed the event. Orlando Douglas sang the national anthem. Chaplain Alan Snyder delivered the invocation. Dylan D'Andrea shared a story of Scouting's impact on him with attendees.

Membership vice president John Scheib set forth the purpose of the day. The opening and closing flag ceremonies were conducted by members of Crew and Pack 408 of Virginia Beach and Troop 212 of Chesapeake. **Joe Theismann** is an entrepreneur and the former quarterback for the Washington Redskins.

He spent the last two decades working for ESPN on their NFL broadcast and the NFL Network. Theismann joined EPSN after spending two seasons as an NFL analyst for CBS Sports.

A 12-year NFL veteran, Theismann played in 163 consecutive games from 1974-1985 and holds Redskins' records for passing yardage (25,206), completions (2,044) and attempts (3,602).

A two-time Pro Bowl selection, Theismann led Washington to a 27-17 victory over Miami Dolphins in Super Bowl XVII.





Theismann was selected the NFL's "Man of the Year" in 1982 for his community service and dedication to the health and welfare of children.

He won the league's 1983 "Most Valuable Player" Award for leading the Redskins to an NFL-record 541 points and a second consecutive Super Bowl appearance.

His career ended abruptly in 1985 after sustaining a broken leg during a game against the New York Giants on national television.

Theismann graduated in 1971 from the University of Notre Dame where he received All-America honors and led the Fighting Irish to consecutive Cotton Bowls and was runner-up to Jim Plunkett in the Heisman Trophy balloting.

In 2003, Theismann was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

### LOCAL SCOUT'S QUICK ACTION PREVENTS HOUSE FIRE

Matthew Vincent Lee, a Life Scout in Troop 901 chartered to St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Chesapeake, received a National Certificate of Merit from the Boy Scouts of America. Only approximately 100 of these are awarded annually.

Lee, age 14, received the award on May 19, 2016, at the Tidewater Council's Annual Recognition Event, held at Bayside Presbyterian Church in Virginia Beach.

At approximately 7:45 pm on December 21, 2015, Lee smelled smoke from the front of his house. Suspecting his home was on fire, he quickly unplugged electronic and electric devices while searching for the source of the fire. Upon finding no fire inside, Lee then went outside.

After he and his father had checked the outdoor Christmas lighting, they found nothing amiss. Before going back inside, Lee scanned the neighborhood. He then noticed smoke coming from the house across the street.

Quickly pointing this out to his father, they went into the neighbor's yard to investigate. After that, they discovered that a grease fire has started in a charcoal grill that was next to the house. The fire was melting the vinyl siding.

Lee's father went to notify the neighbors while Matthew went to get their home fire extinguisher. They used three fire extinguishers and the water hose to put out the fire, preventing it from spreading to their neighbor's home.



# PAUL D. FRAIM HONORED WITH PRESTIGIOUS **COLGATE DARDEN SCOUTER CITIZEN AWARD**

The Honorable Paul D. Fraim, former mayor of the City of Norfolk, was named the 2016 Colgate W. Darden, Jr. "Scouter Citizen of the Year" by the Tidewater Council of the Boy Scouts of America. The "Scouter Citizen of the Year" award is bestowed upon individuals who exemplify public service in the community.

The event was named for the former Virginia governor, who also twice served as president of Tidewater Council BSA.

Mayor Fraim received the award at the 31<sup>st</sup> Annual Colgate W. Darden, Jr., Gala Benefit Auction on Saturday, November 5, 2016 at the Westin - Virginia Beach Town Center.

A Norfolk native, Fraim was first elected to City Council in 1986 and served as the City's Mayor from 1994 to 2016. As Mayor, he presided over building of the light-rail system, construction of MacArthur Center and the Slover Library. He has served on numerous boards and commissions and been a driving force in the redevelopment of downtown Norfolk.

Celebrated professionals, leaders and supporters of the scouting program in Hampton Roads gathered for the annual event. The gala is a major fundraiser with all of the \$90,000+ in proceeds benefitting the Tidewater Council, which relies on this event to raise critical funds needed to serve the youth in our community and sustain our work. A member of Norfolk City Council since 1986, he was appointed Mayor on July 1, 1994, and was reappointed every two years until May 2006 when he became the first popularly elected mayor since 1916. He retired as mayor in 2016.

### Meet the Local Eagle Scout Who Works on the Megahit Videogame Destiny

The real heroes at Bungie, the videogame company behind sci-fi blockbusters *Halo* and *Destiny*, don't wear armor.

They're guys like Matthew Ward, Eagle Scout and the company's cinematic director, who wore an untucked button-up, jeans and red sneakers during an interview at his office in Bellevue, Wash., for *Eagles' Call* magazine.

Ward is Bungie's cinematic director for *Destiny*, the studio's 2014 space sensation that won hundreds of industry awards. At a place that both foster creativity and attracts creative people, Ward fit in perfectly.

While he couldn't take us into the secret spaces where designers were hard at work on Bungie's next videogame, he did take us inside the fascinating world of Matthew Ward — from Scouting to show business to gaming glory.

Ward earned Scouting's highest honor as a member of Troop 212 in Chesapeake, Va. For his Eagle project, he led a team of volunteers as they constructed a children's library.

He noticed that the project required him to manage several smaller pieces that combined to form something bigger. The skills acquired on that project still help him today.

"Funny thing is, a game as big as *Destiny* has smaller projects inside that all stack together," he said. "My team takes big, big chunks, and we work together and produce something beautiful out of it."

Ward's job is creating cinematic cut scenes. Those are the

movie-like moments in a videogame when the player puts down his controller to watch part of the story unfold.

Much of his time is spent in a motion-capture studio where he directs Spandex-clad actors as they walk, tumble and climb in front of cameras.

Ward hasn't always worked in videogames. He got his start in films, working on what's called previsualization. Before a director films a scene heavy with special effects, he or she relies on previsualization to, well, visualize the action.

Guys like Ward use computers to create a 3-D rendering of the director's vision — far more effective than storyboards used in the pre-digital era.

Ward acquired his skills at the Savannah College of Art and Design in Georgia. He eventually got hired for big-budget films like *Star Wars Episode II: Attack of the Clones, The Polar Express* and *Superman Returns*.

Before all that, though, Ward attended the 1989 National Scout Jamboree in Virginia. It was there he heard fellow Eagle Scout Steven Spielberg speak.

Spielberg was at the Jamboree to announce the new Cinematography merit badge (now called the Moviemaking merit badge).

"I still remember Steven Spielberg speaking," Ward said. "And inspiring us in ways that I didn't think, later in life, I'd be remembering. Maybe that had something to do with leading me down this path."

Twenty-seven years after that jamboree, Ward appreciates how Scouting set him on a course for success.

"Scouting probably was the first experience I had in being a leader and being asked to be responsible for more than just my-self," he said.

### VETERINARIAN RECEIVES HIS OVERDUE EAGLE SCOUT AWARD

After a 27-year wait, Andrew Silverstone, DVM, received the rank of Eagle Scout from the Tidewater Council on Thursday, May 19, 2016 at Baylake United Methodist Church in Virginia Beach.

As a teenager living in Ohio in 1989, Silverstone was working toward completing the requirements for the Eagle Scout award – Scouting's highest youth rank – when a series of unfortunate events delayed his Board of Review.

Although he had completed all of the requirements for the Eagle Scout rank prior to turning 18 years old, Andrew contracted mononucleosis as he neared the application deadline.

At the same time, his troop in Ohio mourned the loss of his Scoutmaster, who passed away unexpectedly. Further, his troop's replacement Scoutmaster was unfamiliar with the procedures to request a time extension.

In 2015, Dr. Silverstone, now a veterinarian, discovered that he was eligible to apply for a belated Eagle Award. He contacted the Tidewater Council BSA, after which its Council advancement committee reviewed his application.

Under the leadership of John Klemenc, the advancement committee recommended approval to the National Council, which endorsed the recommendation and approved Dr. Silverstone's Eagle Award.


