... during round-up

- Conduct an opening ceremony.
- Help with games during the pack adults' meeting.
- Teach boys the Bobcat requirements during the pack adults' meeting.
- Assist with boy talks and walk-throughs at schools.

... at a Cub Scout outdoor fun day

- Demonstrate outdoor and camping skills to Cub Scouts and their families.
- Help boys experience hands-on outdoor activities.
- Help boys with rank requirements involving outdoor activities.







... during BALOO training

- Serve as instructors.
- Provide equipment.
- Put on demonstrations.

... for the troop and associated packs

- Be liaison between packs and the troop.
- Serve as a camping resource for pack leaders.
- Help plan outdoor pack events.



- Help packs get the equipment they need for outdoor events.
- Assist pack leaders during pack campouts and other events.
- Help the pack evaluate campouts and events.
- Serve as den chiefs at pack campouts.
- Assist with graduation ceremony/transition events.

... for the council and district

- Promote outdoor events at pow wows, roundtables, and pack meetings.
- Give demonstrations at outdoor events.
- Help with the Cub Scouts' activities at outdoor events.
- Develop and maintain a "where-to-go" booklet for packs.
- Help with Cub Scout camp work weekends.
